Improving water quality to create a stronger community

Mission Springs Water District is recognized worldwide for its great-tasting, high-quality water earning an unprecedented ten medals at the International Water Tasting Competition in Berkeley Springs, West Virginia. **The secret ingredient is our groundwater.** To preserve this valuable resource for generations to come, MSWD broke ground recently on its Regional Water Reclamation Facility. Construction of the \$68 million wastewater treatment plant and related projects marks the beginning of a better future for water in the Desert Hot Springs area.

The new plant will expand treatment capacity and allow the District to transfer an additional 700 homes and businesses from septic tanks to the centralized sewer system. Property owners will no longer need to worry about maintaining their personal systems, and the entire community will benefit from improved wastewater treatment. The sewer system ensures untreated wastewater from septic tanks doesn't seep into and contaminate groundwater.

When the facility is operational next fall, it will process up to 1.5 million gallons of wastewater each day – a 75% increase in system capacity when coupled with the District's existing Desert Crest and Alan L. Horton Wastewater Treatment Facilities. Other upgrades include more than 17,000 feet of pipes connecting additional customers to the system.

The project provides additional benefits for current and future customers. Reduced wastewater volume at the Horton Wastewater Treatment Plant will extend the operational life of that facility by about 10 years. The increased treatment capacity will also support future growth in Desert Hot Springs and the surrounding area.

Nighttime is the right time for outdoor watering

New approaches to help you conserve

Dry conditions persist across California, intensifying drought impacts in all regions of the state. While MSWD has access to a stable supply of groundwater sufficient to meet demand, the District is taking action to protect supplies and reduce water use during the drought.

In June, in response to state drought emergency orders, MSWD moved to Level 2 of its Water Shortage Contingency Plan. Water waste patrols are increasing, restaurants are only allowed to serve water upon request, overseeding lawns is discouraged and outdoor irrigation is prohibited during daylight hours.

Not only is it important to water early in the morning during a drought to minimize evaporation, but this is also key to ensuring plants and grass retain moisture. Watering during the night and early morning allows more of the water to reach the roots.

Cash in on conservation rebates

Water-saving upgrades will reduce water use and save you money over time. To sweeten the deal, MSWD offers cash rebates to help offset the initial costs of these upgrades.

Ditch the grass with an outdoor makeover!



Reduce outdoor water usage by converting lawns to desert-friendly landscaping. The Turf Removal Rebate Program offers rebates of \$2 per square foot for turf replacement. Residential customers can receive up to \$3,000 in rebates and commercial customer rebates top out at \$10,000.

Don't flush money down the drain!

Replace your toilet with a high-efficiency model and get up to \$100 back from MSWD. Residential customers qualify for rebates on toilets that use 1.28 gallons or less per flush. Proof of purchase and evidence of recycling of the old toilet is required.

Behind on your bills? Help is available to avoid disconnections!

At Mission Springs Water District, we believe that supporting our neighbors builds a stronger, more connected community. Due to restrictions in California's Constitution, MSWD cannot offer discounted water rates or bill credits/forgiveness to low-income or senior customers. However, the District offers payment plans to help customers bring their accounts current. MSWD has also partnered with multiple community agencies to help customers in need.

The Low Income Household Water Assistance Program (LIHWAP) is a temporary emergency assistance program to help low-income families with past due water/sewer bills, up to \$2,000. To qualify, you must be a Riverside County resident, have an unpaid water/sewer bill, and meet income guidelines. MSWD has also partnered with United Way of the Desert to create Help2Others, a fund that provides bill assistance to low-income customers. MSWD employees and vendors contribute thousands of dollars each year to Help2Others and United Way of the Desert to meet this need.

Eligible MSWD customers who participate in Help2Others can receive a \$100 credit on their water bill once in a 12-month period. Renters may also qualify for utility assistance through United Lift. All MSWD customers can also set up payment plans to provide additional time to become current on their accounts.
